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I. <u>GENERAL COMMENTS</u>:

Last year, the Lemon Grove Substation sustained extensive water damage when the roof failed during a heavy rainstorm. As a result, the Lemon Grove Substation is under construction. Until construction is complete, Lemon Grove is using the Sheriff's Rancho San Diego Substation. Deputy Russo noted that construction is behind schedule and will likely not be complete until early 2025.

The Rancho San Diego Substation is a fairly modern facility, clean and well-lit. The area used for detaining youth has appropriate signage, a cement bench with a metal bar that, in combination with handcuffs, can be used to secure detained youth, a bathroom, a desk, and one-way mirror that allows deputies to observe detained youth. Bottled water, snacks and blankets are available for detainees.

Deputy Russo was very helpful. He gave the JJC inspection team a brief tour of relevant areas of the Rancho San Diego Substation and then took the team to the briefing room to review files, organized by month, reporting the secure and non-secure detention of minors in 2023. When the team had questions about a file, Deputy Russo arranged for the arresting deputy to come in from the field to answer our questions.

a. **RECOMMENDATIONS** (if any):

The inspection team recommends providing deputies with a training session on how to complete the secure and non-secure forms. Deputy Russo liked the idea of a joint presentation by himself and Commission representatives. He also suggested adding a few check boxes to document certain details of juvenile detentions.

Deputy Russo should notify the state that the number of youth in secure detention during 2023 was mistakenly reported as three, but the inspection team identified eight.
